

RUMC IN THE NEWS

Rockville United Methodist Church has received some good press recently. Copies of the articles from the Journal Inquirer are on our website on the **RUMC in the News** page under **Share Your Spark**.

Dear Church Family,

As always, Easter was a special time in our church family and the events of the **Palm Sunday Breakfast**, **The Ecumenical Maundy Thursday Service**, **The Good Friday Walk and the Easter Worship Service** was meaningful to our faith.



Our religious faith is based on the empty tomb, when Jesus conquered sin and death. However in the first week after Easter our lectionary centers on the doubts of the Apostle Thomas. If we were to look in a spiritual window, it might surprise many that we are much like him. When you think of it doubt in itself is not necessarily a bad thing, but an unsettled state of opinion. It can also be a means of spiritual growth with a little research and reflection.

Thomas was fortunate; he eventually saw Jesus and believed. But if any of you still have doubts, let me challenge you to do something about it. Don't rely on hearsay ideas or erroneous information that you might have been taught, but settle the question once and for all.

May I suggest you read the gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John's account of the death and resurrection and do a systematic analysis. Absorb the words and let them speak to you. Read both pro and con resurrection articles on the internet. Let me recommend Frank Morison's **Who Moved the Stone** or Josh McDowell's **More than a Carpenter and New Evidence that Demands a Verdic** or the cd **The Case for Christ** by Lee Strobel.

Be honest in your appraisal and hopefully, as you examine the evidence, you can say like the Apostle Thomas of old, "My Lord and my God".

Bishop Devadhar and District Superintendent David Calhoun have announced that they intend to transfer Pastor Paul O'Neil to the Hillsborough United Methodist church in New Hampshire effective July 1, 2018. Pastor O'Neil's replacement is pending.

The United Methodist Church operates under the "itinerant" system, which means pastors go and serve wherever the bishop sends them. In a given year there are retirements, sickness, family considerations, etc.; thus the annual movement of pastors. The bishop's goal is to match the gifts and graces of the particular pastor and the ministry needs of a given congregation; these will be considered for Rockville United Methodist Church.

It has been a delight serving you in the gift card program and working with Lisa. Sadly, it is time for us to move on. If you are interested in co-coordinating the Gift Card Program, please let me know. It will require about an hour and a half each week or less. Ninety-six walkers gathered on Good Friday morning to sign in, greet one another, and pray before starting out on this year's twenty mile walk: individuals, families, friends—all walking to raise money for Sharing, Inc. and Cornerstone Overnight Shelter. All walking because Jesus walked so many, many years ago. 1/3 of the money raised goes to Cornerstone Overnight Shelter; 2/3 to Sharing, Inc.

Kay Doherty was with us to make these presentations, and she expressed her heartfelt appreciation to all of us for supporting her and Sharing, Inc. for so many years!!

We need approximately 40 volunteers at the event to portion, seal, and pack for shipment 10,000 meals. Approximately \$3,000 must be raised to support this life-changing event. Donations are being collected and the sign-up sheet is available at Rockville United Methodist Church or online at

The meals provide protein, vitamins, minerals, and carbohydrates to the malnourished. They are packaged in sealed plastic and, unopened, can last up to two years. Many of the recipients are school children who otherwise would be too hungry to concentrate on their lessons. THE MARRI FAMILY*

In December, 2015 Mohamed and Aisha Marri and their seven children arrived in Connecticut under the Refugee Resettlement Act. The Marri's come from a small town near Aleppo, Syria. They fled their home in Syria six years ago and lived in a refugee camp in southern Turkey for the next five years. Mahmoud, their oldest child, describes the camp days, "We lived in a tent for most of those years, our family and several other relatives. The last few months we were moved to a nice apartment with running water, a kitchen, and a bathroom. Soon after that we received notice that we would be moving to America." During those years in the camp the children received very few opportunities to attend school. Now they are catching up as they attend school in New Britain.

Mohammed and Aisha have eight delightful children. I can vouch for that as I see them every week. A new baby girl was born this week making the number of children eight. Then there is Ahmed, just two and arriving here as an infant. Wiaam is five, a girl with a strong will and very smart. She will start school in the fall. Suhaib is a sweet boy who is doing well in Kindergarten and learning to read and speak English. Ahib is in third grade and does well with spoken English. She frequently interprets for her dad. Aamina and Muna arrive home from school all smiles saying they had a good day. The girls are just a year apart and in addition to school they are expected to help with household chores. The girls are wearing the jihab, the traditional head covering. Mahmoud, the eldest boy, is in middle school and does very well with spoken English, frequently taking charge with his younger siblings. He is especially good with his little two-year-old brother. This is a busy household and can get a little chaotic and noisy. This is an adjustment for me as I grew up an only child, but I love it, always gaining more than I give. Being with this family is complex as our cultures are quite different and their needs here as they settle into live in America are great. There is a fine line between giving them fish to eat and teaching them how to fish. I struggle with that all of the time.

A small army of people interact with the Marri's. Perhaps the main groups are the Mosque in Berlin with Wail and Ghoufran Allababidi, spending a great deal of time. The Rockville United Methodist Church Refugee Committee, led by Steve Yoder and Stan Culy have been very involved from the beginning.

Jackie Abbott from NUMC has recently joined the group. She encouraged our Mission Committee and the Knitters to give Aisha a baby shower, to celebrate new life. The shower was proclaimed a huge success.

Immigration is in the news nearly every day. We are blessed to see immigrants here in our midst and begin to understand their plight and their hope for a better life.

APRIL IS PARKINSON'S AWARENESS MONTH

Parkinson's disease (PD) is a neurodegenerative disorder.... Symptoms generally develop slowly over years. Some early warning signs of Parkinson's can be found at http://www.parkinson.org/understanding-parkinsons/10-early-warning-signs. Scientists are exploring ways to identify biomarkers for PD that can lead to earlier diagnosis and more tailored treatments to slow down the disease process.

"Every April, the Parkinson's Foundation engages the Parkinson's community near and far to raise awareness about both PD and the foundation....Our theme is 'Start a Conversation,' a call to action that urges people to talk about Parkinson's with their friends, family, neighbors, healthcare team, local businesses and community. It also reflects the speech bubble in the foundation's signature P logo."

"Submit a 'My PD Story' or encourage someone you know to tell his/her story. 'My PD' stories powerfully illustrate what it's like to live with Parkinson's and how our programs and resources provide hope and support. These stories elevate voices we need to hear. Visit Parkinson.org/MyPDStory to share a story.

Although Parkinson's Disease was first identified almost 200 years ago, it was a disease that didn't get much attention. Parkinson's disease became a hot news item when Michael J. Fox announced that he was leaving his popular sitcom due to the affects of the disease. Mr. Fox then directed his considerable energy into gathering the information and experts needed to find a cure. The Michael J. Fox Foundation for Parkinson's Research gathers resources for research, clinical trials, fundraising, and awareness in one place, https://www.michaeljfox.org. "The Michael J. Fox Foundation is dedicated to finding a cure for Parkinson's disease through an aggressively funded research agenda and to ensuring the development of improved therapies for those living with Parkinson's today. ...Ultimately we have only one definition of success: Scientific solutions that produce tangible improvements in patients' lives." ²
