

Youth Basketball Fellowship:



Families Anonymous: ¹For relatives and friends concerned about the use of drugs or related behavioral problems.

Welcome! At one time or another we have all been in your shoes. We came to our first meeting angry, confused, frustrated, hopeless, and fed-up. In Families Anonymous we found a way to cope with our situation and learned a better way to live; a way that permitted us to live comfortably, in spite of the actions of the person who brought us here.

This is a Twelve-Step program, and there is much literature to read and absorb. We encourage you to study the program, ask questions and share experiences. Meetings are different every week, with different leaders, so we learn something new each time we attend. We also encourage you to talk to long-time members. As members share experiences, you may find someone with whom you feel comfortable enough to talk. Eventually you may form a comfortable relationship with a particular long-time member and may want to ask him or her to be your 'sponsor'. A sponsor will help you focus on the twelve steps and guide you through them.

If the road ahead seems daunting, please visit us for one meeting. Healing begins by taking that first step.

While the parents are learning, their young children are preparing for pre-school in a safe, fun environment. Many lasting friendships are made in these classrooms.

- The IRA rollover allows donors 70½ or older to transfer up to \$100,000 directly from their IRA to charity each year.
- An IRA rollover gift is a tax-exempt distribution. Qualifying individuals can make charitable gifts using pre-tax IRA assets rather than taking a distribution, paying income taxes and using after-tax assets to make a charitable gift.
- An IRA rollover gift can be used to meet all or part of an IRA required minimum distribution.
- A permanent IRA rollover will give qualifying individuals certainty, allowing them to better manage their income, taxes and charitable giving.
- The bill is retroactive to December 31, 2014. If you made a gift directly from your IRA to us at any point during 2015, your gift will qualify as a rollover gift.


