
Sunday, February 22.... 7:00 pm

Dear Friends:

It's been a wild winter; snow falling every other day it seems and very little rise in temperature. But, by March, I begin to see the world somewhat differently. I like the feeling of certainty...it is something I can count on. We all can.

That's kind of nice, isn't it?

There is the possibility of a better end result than the circumstances leading up to the moment might have indicated. The season of Lent is much like this. There is a solemn service of ashes, which ultimately reminds us of our earthly life and its eventual end but later, in the season, we begin to feel the hope of new life, eternal life, a life promised by Christ's willingness to die our death so we can live in God's eternal presence forever. I have to admit: I do like Lent. I like what it means, where it leads, and how it calls us all into a time of reflection and prayer. It holds its own hidden blessings.

As we continue to move through the Lenten season – a season, which will be redeemed by the witness of the empty cross and tomb, I hope you will find some time to search out the hidden blessings of your faith. Just as we can count on spring and the warming sun, we can count on Easter and the risen Son. We have much for which to be grateful.

1 tsp. sugar
4 cups flour



Dissolve yeast in warm water. Stir in sugar and salt. Add 2 cups flour, and work in remainder. Knead until smooth. Let rise for at least one hour.

Wow, is this winter ever going to end? I'm sure you're asking that same question. As I am quickly approaching another year older, and would like to think another year wiser; I searched the recesses of my brain for a newsletter article to write.... I kept coming back to our confirmation class of 2015.

Beginning on January 4th, Pastor Ricki and Linda Shivers met with the upcoming "potential" confirmation candidates and their parents to lay out "Orientation" and a schedule of classes ...what to expect in confirmation class. I was most interested and excited about the various topics (hoping to possibly learn something new) and the many potential "field trips" that our youth would be participating in. At that moment, I decided to join in, not only as a parent of one of the class members, but also as a possible mentor to someone else.

Linda didn't waste any time getting the youth involved, and we hit the ground running with our first "field trip" to the soup kitchen in downtown Rockville. Our youth planned, prepped and served a hot meal to all that came through the door that day. *It was one of their biggest days for serving meals. I think we served well over 60 people on a Saturday for lunch time, including children.* I was the first contact in line as I handed out the plates; each person there that day I greeted with kind words and a smile. It was such a humbling and rewarding experience to sit down at the tables and listen to *their* stories. I feel blessed to have been part of the experience. I know the class loved it too, as they were already asking to do it again soon!

Our next venture was a trip to First Cathedral in Bloomfield. I was in awe as we stepped through the doors of a Cathedral that can seat 5,000 people. We were greeted by a member and given a tour of the facility. Then an Associate Pastor continued the tour with us and we were able to sit, actually make that *STAND* through part of their worship service and take communion together as a group. The service was uplifting and loud, filled with music and a large praise band and a choir of 60-70 people. (When they are in full choir, they have over 200 members.) Can you imagine a choir so big?! I walked away with an appreciation for a different type of service than certainly what we Methodists are used to. Once again, I think our youth were excited too. We followed up our trip with a sit down Q & A to hear what the kids had to say about the service and the experience.

And last to this point...our trip to a Mosque in Ellington one Sunday afternoon. Dr. Saud Anwar and his lovely wife sat down to talk to us about their Muslim faith, their mosque and what it means to them. Again, I walked away feeling blessed to have been part of the experience with our youth and to have gained a better understanding and appreciation for their faith.

Maundy Thursday...What is That?

Maundy Thursday, also known as "Holy Thursday", is the name given to the day on which Jesus celebrated the Passover with His disciples, known as the Last Supper.

The night before Jesus was crucified, he had supper with his disciples. Jesus realized that this last meal would be his final opportunity to guide his disciples before his crucifixion. Before the meal, he washed his disciples' feet as an act of humility and service, thereby setting an example that we should love and serve one another in humility (John 13:3-17). During supper he spoke at length about his purposes, what his followers should do, and the promise of the Holy Spirit to come. He broke bread into pieces, giving it his disciples saying "This is my body, given for you. Do this in remembrance of me". He then took the cup of wine, shared it with his disciples and said, "This wine is the token of God's new covenant to save you, an agreement sealed with the blood I will pour out for you" (Luke 22:19-20). This is the biblical basis for the practice of Communion.

Maundy Thursday is observed on the Thursday of Passion Week, one day before Good Friday. Once again, we will holding a special service that evening (April 2^{nd} - 7:00). A reenactment of the Last Supper while reading the Passion

Story will take place, including a special communion. We hope you can join us in observing Maundy Thursday in a way that truly honors what happened at the Last Supper.

There were so many nice things in worship last Sunday that I wanted to write them all down. The first thing that was special about the service was a flute-voice duet of a beautiful piece by Johann Sebastian Bach called "Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring." Nat Woodruff played the lively flute part and Terri Goldich gave a lovely rendition of the melody.

Pastor Ricki dedicated the rest of the service to Black History Month and we sang ten Negro Spirituals, most of them with interesting historical backgrounds, often with hidden messages for the slaves.

Stan Culy told a Christ Story about seeing God in nature as in sunrises and sunsets. He said that in those times and when he sees the stars at night, millions and millions of miles away, he feels close to God.

Pastor Ricki had a very inspiring benediction at the end of the service. She asked everyone to move out of the pews, stand against the wall and hold the hand of the person next to them. While doing that she recounted her last visit with Lou Furnas this week before he died. She saw how beautiful his hands were and helped us to realize how special were all of our hands, especially holding them together.

After the service, we brought canned goods to the Fellowship Hall for the Community Pantry and were served tasty "sundaes" by Eileen Gay!

Stan Culy shares his experience of "**God Moments in Nature**" as he shared in church on February 8, 2015.

There have been several times in the past year when the church council was doing some planning ahead and repeatedly asked the question: "How can we make our morning worship time more meaningful?" One of the suggestions was that we invite people to tell about moments of inspiration in their life. We are calling these "Christ Stories", when we feel the spirit of Christ around us or in us.

Last December, Karen Stearns told the story of a student talking deeply about his faith that inspired her. She felt the Spirit of Christ through his words. Two weeks ago, Geoff Gerow told the story of trying to find a person to help pay their cleaning bill and got the clerk engaged with the search as well. The simple truth is that we often find the Spirit of Christ with us when we are helping people. Last Sunday, we heard Mel Bacha talking about his journey of faith beginning when he felt so welcomed when he first came to our church

I would like to talk about a couple of what I call "God Moments " in nature when I feel God's presence in its wonder and its beauty. I love going out at night when I can see the stars, knowing they are millions and millions of miles away. It makes me feel the bigness of God and I feel part of the universe The Hebrew people who wrote the Old Testament of our Bible thought that the stars were pin-holes of light in a giant ceiling of sky they called the firmament. Through these holes they believed the rain came down! Even this pre-scientific understanding of space deepens my appreciation of creation.

Other God-moments I have had are at sunrise and sunset and I have beautiful pictures taken when Judie and I were at the right place at the right time. Sometimes the whole sky is lit up in pink or orange or red or yellow. Sometimes there are clouds with a silver lining. Sometimes there are shafts of light coming down from the heavens like a spot-light on earth. The verse of a hymn comes to mind, "The heavens are telling the glory of God." In moments like these, I feel close to God.

There are so many, many different ways we experience God that we are hoping that many of you will share the moments when this awareness has come to you. Perhaps you can write it down or talk with me and between the two of us we can find a way to present it. When we hear one person's expression of faith, it enriches our own faith. This is one of

the benefits of coming to worship together.
